On August 14, 1965, President Lyndon Johnson signed the Older Americans Act (OAA) into law.

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In November 2000, through the reauthorization of the Older Americans Act (OAA), the National Family Caregiver Support Program or NFCSP became law.

In addition to family caregivers of older individuals, NFCSP provides supportive services to grandparents and other relatives aged 55 and older who are raising children.

During the 2020 reauthorization of OAA, the 10% spending limit for grandparents and other relatives aged 55 and older was discontinued.



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National Family Caregiver Support **Program**

Who is Eligible?

- Caregivers who are 18+ where the Care Recipient is 60+ and the Care Recipient is "Frail"
 Caregivers who are 18+ where the Care Recipient has Early Onset Dementia

- Caregiver is 55+ and the Care Recipient is a relative under the age of 18.
 The caregiver is 55+ and the Care Recipient is between ages 18 and 59 and has a significant
 There are no fees or income requirements to enroll in NFCSP.



What can the program provide?

- Childcare
- Extra-curricular school activity fees and supplies
- Tutoring or educational aids Summer camps
- Transportation Home modifications to create a safe
- environment Equipment and supplies necessary for the relative in caring for the child
- Adaptive equipment or
- assistive technology for the caregiver such as raised toilet seat, grab bars, emergency response system, etc.
- Legal expenses related to establishing guardianship or custody
- Individualized services as approved that assist the relative in caring for the child

How do I apply? Contact your County or Tribal Aging Office or Aging & Disability Resource Center (ADRC) to apply. Specifically, inquire about NFCSP.

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Why is Respite Important?

- While family caregivers often find great satisfaction in providing care
 to their loved ones, caregiving's physical and emotional demands can
 contribute to poor caregiver health outcomes, including stress, fatigue,
 poor sleep, and increased risk for chronic health conditions.
 - What does this mean? Respite care is a critical public health intervention!



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Grants for Family Caregivers



The Caregiver Respite Grant Program provides financial support for family caregivers for up to 5 days of respite care within 30 days of application approval. This grant allows approved applicants to hire the respite care provider of their choice for the care recipient.



Eligibility Criteria

To be eligible for the grant, applicants (the primary or family caregiver) must have the applicable ADRC, Tribal ADRS, county case manager, etc., complete the <u>Supporting Documentation Form</u> showing the care recipient:

- 1. Has applied for a Long-term Care Waiver or other programs and not expecting to receive services or approval within thirty (30) days of the application
- 2.Has been denied Long-Term Care Waiver support(s) or other programs that provide respite services
- 3.Has been approved for Term Care Waiver support(s) or other programs that provide respite services and has exhausted funds from said programs
- 4. Has applied and is receiving other supports, and the applicant needs flexibility for services not covered by current funding supports.
- 5.Has not applied for a Long-Term Care Waiver support(s) because they are ineligible for other supports

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CRGP 4 Step Application Process Step 1: The applicant completes the Eligibility Criteria Form (ECF), and the ADRC of County completes the Supporting Documentation Form (SDF). Step 2: Once the ECF and SDF have been completed and submitted to RCAW, RCAW will email eligible applicants with a link to the grant application. Step 3: Once RCAW receives the completed CRGP application, RCAW will notify the applicant the application is approved via email with a link to the Grant Report that must be completed and submitted once respite services. Inter been provided. Step 4: Once RCAW receives the completed Grant Report, the payment for respite is sent, and the applicant receives a link to complete the CRGP Respite Experience Survey. (Applicants can not reapply if they do not submit this survey.)

Supporting Documentation Form



The SDF is utilized for the Caregiver Respite and Supplemental Respite Grant Programs.

The SDF verifies that other Long -Term Care (LTC) waivers and caregiver support programs cannot provide respite care services to the applicant, as this program is typically the payor of last resort.

The Supplemental Respite Grant Program supports primary caregivers by providing \$250 for supplemental respite services. Applicants can reapply every 90 days.

This grant allows you to hire the person of your choice to help

you with

- meal prep.
- · mear prep
- laundry,
- · lawn care,
- snow removal,
 transportation.
- sensory items, and
- technology.



Eligible Expenses:

- 1. Qualified home modifications (does not include construction, painting, remodeling, or wear-and-tear upgrades):
- · Wheelchairramps,
- Grab bars,
- 2. Assistive technology, emergency response systems, and home safety interventions
- (does not include new televisions, new washers/dryers, etc.), 3. Home-delivered meals or in-home meal preparation,
- 4. Technology to decrease isolation and increase social engagement:
- Tablets/Computers to communicate with friends, family, etc.
- 6. Lawn mowing,
- 7. Snow removal,
- Transportation to meaningful or respite activities or medical appointments.

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Wisconsin Respite Care Registry





This FREE registry connects those needing respite care with respite care providers. Direct care professionals or providers can sign up to be respite care providers and find meaningful caregiver jobs. Primary caregivers can search this database for in-home or agency-based respite care providers that most closely meet their needs.



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Registry, cont.



- THERE IS NO COST FOR RESPITE PROVIDERS TO BE LISTED ON THE REGISTRY AND NO COST TO FAMILY CAREGIVERS TO SEARCH THE REGISTRY.
- RESPITE PROVIDERS ON THE REGISTRY HAVE COMPLETED THE RESPITE CARE PROVIDER TRAINING
- THOSE IN NEED OF RESPITE CARE CAN FILTER THEIR SEARCHES BY COUNTY, AGE OF CARE RECIPIENT, AND TYPE OF RESPITE CARE.

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Respite Connections

This FREE resource allows family caregivers to submit posts with their specific respite needs, for example:

- Age of the care recipient(s),
- Acuity/descriptions of care needs,
 Hours of respite needed,
- Location & county,
- Payment sources.

Respite providers looking for clients can search Respite Connections and contact families to find meaningful jobs providing respite care.

Family caregivers can also search the <u>Wisconsin Respite Care</u>
<u>Registry</u>. This database allows families to find in-home or agencybased respite care providers that most closely meet their needs.



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Provider Training



 The Respite Care Provider Training (RCPT) is for people interested in providing respite care to individuals with varying disabilities and ages across their lifespans. Learners can work to complete the ten required online courses at their own page.

 There is no cost for any of the courses. Upon completion of The RCPT, learners will have the opportunity to be added to The Wisconsin Respite Registry, which is available to primary caregivers to search for respite care providers in their community.
